



## SUSTAINING THE SPECIAL PUBLICATION FISH FOR THE PEOPLE

### INTRODUCTION

To commemorate the first anniversary of the ASEAN-SEAFDEC Conference on Sustainable Fisheries for Food Security in the New Millennium: “Fish for the People” organized in November 2001, the maiden issue of the Special Publication Fish for the People Volume 1 No. 1 was launched in early 2003, from which the Special Publication got its banner title Fish for the People. The aim of the Special Publication was to support the promotion of sustainable fisheries for food security in the Southeast Asian region. The tri-annual Fish for the People is published by the SEAFDEC Secretariat and fully supported by the Japanese Trust Fund. Now on its 18<sup>th</sup> year, the Fish for the People has continually played its essential role in promoting the achievements of SEAFDEC and its Member Countries from the relevant projects and activities on responsible fisheries. Furthermore, the Special Publication has been recognized by the stakeholders specially from the academe, various organizations as well as research institutions as significant source of information to support their works on the sustainable development of fisheries in the region.


#### Print Copies

The SEAFDEC Secretariat is producing 1,600 print copies per issue of Fish for the People.







The analytics indicated that even during the digital era, print copies of the Special Publication continued to be high in demand specifically from network libraries and libraries in countries with limited access to the Internet. Also, the popularity of Fish for the People was raised because of the availability of electronic copies in the SEAFDEC Institutional Repository. Promotion on social media (*i.e.*, Facebook) might have also attracted more users. Although analysis of other indicators in the Repository (no. of annual and monthly downloads, top downloaded issues and articles, geographics, demographics, and others) and social media (no. of likes and shares) is needed.
